



Teaching Workshop: Creating Community in the Classroom

Candace Vogler is a Professor of Philosophy at the University of Chicago, and Principal Investigator on the John Templeton project *Virtue, Happiness, and the Meaning of Life*. She is the author of *Reasonably Vicious* (Harvard University Press) and has published widely in the fields of ethics and the history of philosophy. She is a Distinguished Visiting Fulbright Professor at Notre Dame's Institute for Ethics & Society.

Abstract: Moral formation is happening in the higher education classroom whether or not we think about it. How we teach is at least as important as what we teach where this aspect of our students' lives is at issue. In this workshop, Professor Vogler will discuss specific strategies for fostering a classroom environment designed to help our students engage with the material on the syllabus, and with each other, more effectively, with an eye toward contributing to their moral formation at a point in their lives when they are making the decisions that will open or close doors to them for the rest of their maturity, whether we are teaching ethics or math, political science, or biochemistry. Candace will offer strategies for lecture classes and for discussion classes that she has found especially useful, in the hope of sparking ongoing discussion and engagement in the particular pedagogic challenges educators face today.

This workshop is organised by the Institute for Ethics & Society's **Moral Philosophy and Moral Cultivation** research stream, which seeks to facilitate international collaborations and produce excellent research in the field of moral philosophy and the cultivation of virtue. Our work in this field is informed by the Catholic intellectual and moral tradition.
