3 PURPOSE

These Program Requirements set out the approved requirements for the Bachelor of Philosophy/ Bachelor of Theology.

4 OVERVIEW

4.1 Campus Availability:

The Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology has been approved for delivery on the Fremantle Campus, Sydney Campus, and the Catholic Institute of Sydney (CIS) Wagga Wagga Campus.

4.2 Student Availability:

The Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology is available for enrolment to domestic Students and international Students with a student visa.

4.3 Australian Qualifications Framework:

The Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology is accredited by the University as a Level 7 AQF qualification.

4.4 Duration:

The Volume of Learning for the Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology is five (5) years of equivalent full-time study.

An option to complete this Program Part-time is available.

An accelerated option to complete the Program is not available.

4.5 Maximum Duration:

The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete this award is detailed in the University's General Regulations.

4.6 Study Mode:

The Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology is offered in Internal Study mode.

7 PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

7.1 Program Description: Bachelor of Philosophy

The Bachelor of Philosophy program provides a rare opportunity to study the most fundamental questions of reality, of "what is", and of what we can know of our transcendental desires and needs for truth, beauty, and goodness. With its emphasis on critical thinking and asking questions constructively, the degree opens pathways into many career fields and into postgraduate studies. When combined with a Master of Teaching, the BPhil provides an ideal qualification for those wishing to teach Philosophy in schools. The program offers courses in all areas of Philosophy, including: The History of Philosophy, Metaphysics, Philosophy of the Human Person, Logic, Epistemology, Ethics, and Political Philosophy. It also treats particular topics such as Philosophy of Religion, Philosophy of Friendship and Philosophy of Technology.

Program Description: Bachelor of Theology

The Bachelor of Theology is a three (3) year full-time (or equivalent part-time) degree program leading to a first professional qualification in theology. It is designed to provide students with a comprehensive grounding in Biblical and Theological Studies and associated disciplines. It is intended for those who wish to pursue such studies for reasons of personal growth and especially for those who have specific vocational and ministerial goals, in particular, those who intend to apply for leadership roles within education, health, social services and the professions generally.

- 1. Articulate a broad and coherent body of knowledge, with depth in the underlying principles and concepts in the discipline of philosophy as a basis for independent lifelong learning.

- 3. Demonstrate technical skills to a broad understanding of knowledge with depth in philosophy
- 4. Exercise critical thinking and judgement in identifying and solving problems with intellectual independence
- 5. Communicate and present a clear, coherent, and independent exposition of philosophical knowledge and concepts
- 6. Apply philosophical reflection, knowledge, and skills to demonstrate autonomy, welldeveloped theoretical and practical judgement, and ethical responsibility.

- 1. Articulate a broad and coherent body of knowledge, with depth in the underlying principles and concepts in the discipline of theology as a basis for independent lifelong learning.

- 6. Apply theological reflection, knowledge, and skills to demonstrate autonomy, well-developed theoretical and practical judgement, and ethical responsibility.

7.3 Required Courses:

To be eligible for the award of Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology students must complete a minimum of 1000 Units of Credit chosen from the courses listed in Appendix A:

25 Units of Credit from CORE1000 Foundations of Wisdom
25 Units of Credit from one (1) core elective
325 Units of Credit from thirteen (13) philosophy electives
325 Units of Credit from thirteen (13) theology electives
300 Units of Credit from twelve (12) general elective courses

7.4 Philosophy Elective Courses:

Students enrolled in the Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology are required to complete thirteen (13) philosophy elective courses and thirteen (13) theology elective courses (see Appendix A).

7.5 Course substitutions:

Course substitutions are permitted but must be approved by the Dean.

APPENDIX C: Majors and Minors

An eight (8) course major can be added to the Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology and chosen courses may include a combination of 1000 level, 2000 level and 3000 level Courses provided that no more than three Courses are taken at the 1000 level and at least two Courses have to be taken at the 3000 level (*General Regulations* 3.9.1b).

A six (6) course minor can be added to the Bachelor of Philosophy/Bachelor of Theology and chosen courses may include a combination of 1000 level, 2000 level and 3000 level Courses provided that no more than two Courses are taken at the 1000 level and at least one Course has to be taken at the 3000 level (*General Regulations* 3.9.1b).
