These Program Requirements set out the approved requirements for the Bachelor of Secondary Education.

4 **OVFRVIFW**

4.1 **Campus Availability**

The Bachelor of Secondary Education has been approved for delivery on the Sydney Campus.

4.2 **Student Availability**

The Bachelor of Secondary Education is available for enrolment to domestic Students and international Students with a student visa.

4.3 **Australian Qualifications Framework**

The Bachelor of Secondary Education is accredited by the University as a Level 7 AQF qualification.

4.4 Duration

The Volume of Learning for the Bachelor of Secondary Education is four (4) years of equivalent fulltime study.

An option to complete this Program Part-time is available.

An accelerated option to complete the Program is not available.

Maximum Duration 4.5

The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the Bachelor of Secondary Education Award is detailed in the University's General Regulations.

5 **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**

5.1 **University Admission Requirements**

To be eligible for admission to The University of Notre Dame Australia, all applicants must meet the University's minimum requirements for admission. The requirements for admission are detailed in the University's Policy: Admissions.

5.2 **Specific Program Requirements for Admission**

To be eligible for admission to the Bachelor of Secondary Education applicants must also meet the following specific requirements.

Students who have not met the legislative requirements for entry must undertake an 5.2.1 approved pathway

Legislative Requirements

- 1. 3 HSC Band 5s, one of which must be English*
- 2. Band 4 in Mathematics

*Please note ESL English will not count towards the required Band 5 English criterion

Approved Pathways

1. If students do not meet the 3 Band 5 and Band 4 requirement, they must successfully complete eight (8) courses prior to commencing any second-year pedagogy, curriculum, or professional experience courses.

6 PRACTICUM OR INTERNSHIP REQUIREMENTS

6.1 Students are required to complete approximately 27 weeks of professional experience as indicated in the Bachelor of Secondary Education Award Requirements shown in Appendix A.

7 PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

7.1 Program Description

The Bachelor of Secondary Education is a comprehensive undergraduate program that combines theory, the latest teaching technology, and opportunities for practical classroom experience. Working from a rigorous and practical curriculum, students will acquire the requisite academic and practical skills needed to teach early and late adolescents. Students will be required to choose a first teaching area as well as a second teaching area. First teaching area subjects include English, Mathematics, Religious Education, Modern History, Ancient History, Drama and Business Studies. The second teaching area is chosen from this same list of subjects with the addition of Economics, Legal Studies, and Studies of Religion.

An integral part of the program is 27 weeks of supervised professional experience (practicum). During the three professional experience placements, students will be required to teach in both their first and second teaching areas as well as immerse themselves in at least two different secondary school communities. Upon graduation, students are eligible to teach in Catholic, Government and Independent secondary schools in NSW. All teacher education students in NSW must sit the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (LANTITE). The test is administered externally by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER). Education student must register and pay for the test. Education students also need to successfully complete the Graduate Teacher Performance Assessment after their final teaching placement to graduate from this program and be able to register with NESA as an accredited teacher.

7.2 Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the Bachelor of Secondary Education graduates will be able to:

- 1. Apply evidence-based learning and teaching approaches that demonstrate expert judgement in being inclusive of all learners
- 2. Synthesise relevant curriculum to design and implement pedagogy that responds to a diverse range of learners
- 3. Apply advanced literacy and numeracy knowledge and skills across all curricular areas
- 4. Demonstrate an advanced and integrated understanding of scholarly practice to extend professional understanding through inquiry and research
- 5. Establish dispositions of critical reflection to continually improve the teaching and learning cycle
- 6. Integrate creative, effective, and contemporary information and communication technologies to enhance learning
- 7. Interpret student data to design and implement authentic assessment to report on and improve student learning
- 8. Articulate professional values and ethical standards that demonstrate a commitment to secure socially just and sustainable futures for learners
- 9. Engage appropriately and effectively with parents and caregivers and other educational stakeholders to inform responses to education priorities
- 7.3 In their first year, all students will be required to attempt the national Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education (LANTITE). Prior to being eligible for the final internship professional placement in the program all students must successfully demonstrate the required minimum level of personal literacy and numeracy through meeting the standard on LANTITE.

The test is administered externally by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) (https://teacheredtest.acer.edu.au/register). Students will be required to register with ACER and pay for the test.

7.4 Students who have not met the legislative requirement for entry into an initial teacher education program, must undertake an approved pathway. The legislative requirement is three HSC Band 5s, one of which must be English. *

The approved pathway, which is built into the Bachelor of Secondary Education, is that if students do not meet the three Band-5 requirement they must successfully complete eight (8) courses prior to commencing any second-year courses.

*Please note ESL English will not count toward the required Band 5 English criterion

7.5 Required Courses

To be eligible for the award of Bachelor of Secondary Education students must complete a minimum of 800 Units of Credit chosen from the courses listed in Appendix A comprising:

75 Units of Credit from three (3) Core Curriculum Courses

275 Units of Credit from eleven (11) Compulsory Courses including professional experience

100 Units of Credit from four (4) Teaching Methods Courses

250 Units of Credit from ten (10) Courses to complete two Teaching Area Specialisations (6 for first Teaching Area, 4 for second Teaching Area)

100 Units of Credit from four (4) elective Courses

The following Teaching Areas are offered for students in the Bachelor of Secondary Education degree:

- Economics (as a second teaching area only)
- Legal Studies (as a second teaching area only)
- Drama
- Studies of Religion (as a second teaching area only)

Students must have two Teaching Areas as part of this course. Other teaching areas may be available through cross-institutional enrolment.

7.6 Elective Courses

Students enrolled in the Bachelor of Secondary Education are required to complete four elective courses. Elective courses can be selected from the approved list of course offerings listed in Appendix B and C.

7.7 Course substitutions

Course substitutions, where permitted, must be approved by the National Head of School and the National Deputy Head of School.
