Supervision

Each candidate will be assigned supervisors who will provide support and academic guidance throughout the coursework and research components of the degree. The research supervisors will assist the candidate with the early preparation of their research proposal as part of the coursework unit - Developing a Research Proposal. The research supervisors will continue to mentor and direct the candidate throughout the research phase and until the thesis is examined.

Course Structure

The coursework is comprised of four coursework units to be completed along with the student's individual research project. The coursework units will provide opportunities for candidates to formulate substantial elements of their planned research (e.g. topic refinement, identification and justification of the preferred research method(s), preparation of a draft proposal) and to develop personal competencies in critical analysis and scholarly writing relevant to their profession.

The completion of the coursework is facilitated by a unit delivery schedule which takes into consideration that a majority of candidates will be in full-time employment during their candidature.

Course Duration

- The standard time for completion of the Master of Philosophy (not including periods of approved leave of absence) will normally be one and a half calendar years for full-time study.
- Part-time study is also available.
- The minimum time for completion will normally be one year of full time study. This is normally only applicable for students with prior research experience or qualifications.

Admission Requirements

Normally, the following criteria are required for a student to be admitted to the MPhil program:

- Possession of an undergraduate degree from a recognised university, which has been completed at a high credit standard and which demonstrates the applicant's potential to undertake and complete research-based study.
- An equivalent academic background or extensive professional experience that is considered by the Dean of the School to be an appropriate preparation for independent study and research work at Masters level.
- An applicant may be required to satisfy the Dean of the School of the ability to understand and communicate in both written and spoken English at a level adequate for the purpose of pursuing the program of study.

Fees & Scholarships

Domestic Students

In accordance with the Higher Education Support Act 2003, domestic research students are eligible to have all Higher Degree by Research (HDR) course fees paid for by the Commonwealth Government under the Research Training Program (RTP) Stipend Scholarship for the length of their degree.

International Students

All international research students are required to pay full fees for the length of their research degree. Please refer to the International Prospectus for current cost per year to complete a Masters degree.

All international students are encouraged to apply for the *Endeavour International Postgraduate Research Scholarship (EIPRS)* or the University equivalent International Fee Remission Research Scholarship (IFRRS), and the Research Training Program (RTP) Stipend Scholarship.

The EIPRS provides annual fee remission for the successful applicant(s) and meets the cost of a standard Overseas Student Health Cover Policy for the student for the period of the course. The IFRRS covers the annual fee remission for the successful candidate; however students will need to pay for their own Overseas Student Health Cover.
