3 PURPOSE

These Program Requirements set out the approved requirements for the Diploma of Theology, Associate Degree in Theology, Bachelor of Theology, and Bachelor of Theology (Honours).

4 OVERVIEW

4.1 Campus Availability:

The Diploma of Theology, Bachelor of Theology, and Bachelor of Theology (Honours) have been approved for delivery on the Fremantle campus, the Sydney campus, and the Catholic Institute of Sydney (CIS) Sydney campus.

The Associate Degree in Theology has been approved for delivery on the Fremantle campus, and the Catholic Institute of Sydney (CIS) Sydney campus.

4.2 Student Availability:

The Diploma of Theology, Associate Degree in Theology, Bachelor of Theology, and Bachelor of Theology (Honours) are available for enrolment to domestic Students and international Students with a student visa.

4.3 Australian Qualifications Framework:

The Diploma of Theology is accredited by the University as a Level 5 AQF qualification.

The Associate Degree in Theology is accredited by the University as a Level 6 AQF qualification.

The Bachelor of Theology is accredited by the University as a Level 7 AQF qualification.

The Bachelor of Theology (Honours) is accredited by the University as a Level 8 AQF qualification.

4.4 Duration

The Volume of Learning for the Diploma of Theology is one (1) year of equivalent full-time study.

The Volume of Learning for the Associate Degree in Theology is two (2) years of equivalent full-time study.

The Volume of Learning for the Bachelor of Theology is three (3) years of equivalent full-time study.

The Volume of Learning for the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) is one (1) year of equivalent full-time study.

- An option to complete the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) part-time is available.
- An accelerated option to complete the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) is not available.

4.5 Maximum Duration

The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the Diploma of Theology is four (4) years.

The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the Associate Degree in Theology is six (6) years.

The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the Bachelor of

Theology is ten (10) years.

The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) Awards is four (4) years.

4.6 Study Mode

The Diploma of Theology is offered in Internal, External, and Multimodal mode.

The Associate Degree in Theology is offered in Internal, External, and Multimodal mode.

The Bachelor of Theology is offered in Internal, External, and Multimodal mode.

The Bachelor of Theology (Honours) is offered in Internal, External, and Multimodal mode.

4.7 Professional Accreditation

There are no professional accreditation requirements applicable to this Program.

5 ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

5.1 University Admission Requirements:

5.2 Specific Program Requirements for Admission:

There are no further requirements for admission to the Diploma of Theology, Associate Degree in Theology, and Bachelor of Theology.

For the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) the following Admission Requirements and Selection Criteria apply:

- (a) Admission to the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) program is by application and is subject to approval by the Dean.
- (b) Enrolment in the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) program is permitted on a part-time basis with the permission of the Dean.
- (c) Students who have completed a relevant Bachelor's degree at another recognised tertiary institution may be admitted to the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) program provided they meet the selection criteria outlined below.
- (d) Students admitted from other recognised tertiary institutions will be required to undertake one Core Curriculum course in their honours year in addition to the required course work and research thesis.

Selection Criteria

The following selection criteria will be used for a student applying to enrol in the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) program:

- (a) Students entering from the Bachelor of Theology degree:
 - (i) The achievement of a GPA of 3.0 across all courses of study in the Bachelor degree.
 - (ii) No instance of confirmed (documented) misconduct or violation of academic integrity.
- (b) Where a student applies to enrol in the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) from another recognised tertiary institution their prior studies must, in addition the normal entry requirements for this program listed above, also meet the following criteria:
 - (i) A completed Bachelor's degree.

At least thirteen courses of theology within their completed Bachelor's degree

6 PRACTICUM OR INTERNSHIP REQUIREMENTS

There are no practicum or internship requirements for these Programs.

7 PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

7.1 Program Descriptions

The **Diploma of Theology** is a one year full-time (or equivalent part-time) program. It provides a first basic qualification in Theology for those with no previous background in theological studies, as well as being designed for those who wish to update their theological knowledge, or those preparing for or involved in pastoral ministry, or for those who wish to pursue such studies for reasons of personal and spiritual growth.

The **Associate Degree in Theology** is a two (2) year full-time (or equivalent part-time) degree program designed to provide students with broad and technical knowledge in Theological Studies and associated disciplines. It is intended for those who wish to pursue such studies for reasons of personal growth and especially for those who have specific vocational and ministerial goals; in particular, those who intend to apply for leadership roles within education, health, social services and the professions generally.

The **Bachelor of Theology** is a three (3) year full-time (or equivalent part-time) degree program leading to a first professional qualification in theology. It is designed to provide students with a comprehensive grounding in Biblical and Theological Studies and associated disciplines. It is intended for those who wish to pursue such studies for reasons of personal growth and especially for those who have specific vocational and ministerial goals; in particular, those who intend to apply for leadership roles within education, health, social services and the professions generally.

Program Description: Bachelor of Theology (Honours)

An Honours Year promotes higher learning and can be a pathway for further research.

7.2 Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the **Diploma of Theology**, graduates will be able to:

1. Demonstrate theoretical knowledge of Theology in one theological discipline.
2. Identify, analyse, synthesise and act on information drawn from theological sources.
3. Transfer and apply theological knowledge and skills in a range of situations.

Upon successful completion of the **Associate Degree in Theology**, graduates will be able to:

1. Demonstrate broad theoretical knowledge of Theology in one or more theological disciplines.
2. Identify, analyse, synthesise and act on information drawn from theological sources.
3. Communicate theological ideas and concepts clearly and coherently with some intellectual independence.
4. Transfer, apply, and adapt theological knowledge and skills in a range of contexts.

Upon successful completion of the **Bachelor of Theology**, graduates will be able to:

1. Demonstrate a broad and coherent understanding of a body of knowledge in a range of theological disciplines.
2. Critically review, analyse, consolidate, and synthesise theological concepts.
3. Communicate theological ideas and concepts clearly and coherently with intellectual independence.
4. Transfer, apply, and adapt theological knowledge and skills in diverse contexts.
5. Demonstrate initiative and judgement in planning, problem solving and decision making in theological scholarship.

Upon successful completion of the **Bachelor of Theology (Honours)**, students will be able to:

1. Review and interpret the relevant literature and texts in a specialised area of theology to develop an advanced knowledge and understanding of significant concepts and questions.
2. Demonstrate an advanced understanding of theological principles.
3. Explain the wider significance of theology to contemporary life.
4. Critically analyse and reflect on theological concepts and ideas to evaluate and develop theological arguments.
5. Effectively communicate theological knowledge, ideas and principles orally and in written formats.
6. Apply advanced knowledge and scholarly practices to undertake independent theological research.

7.3 Required Courses:

To be eligible for the award of **Diploma of Theology** students must complete a minimum of 200 Units of Credit chosen from the courses listed in Appendix B.

- 25 Units of Credit from one (1) Core Curriculum Course
- 175 Units of Credit from seven (7) Theology electives

To be eligible for the award of **Associate Degree in Theology** students must complete a minimum of 400 Units of Credit chosen from the courses listed in Appendix B. Students studying primarily through CIS may negotiate a substitution agreed upon in consultation with Academic Dean of CIS and Head of School of Philosophy and Theology.

- 50 Units of Credit from two (2) Core Curriculum Courses
- 350 Units of Credit from fourteen (14) Theology electives

To be eligible for the award of **Bachelor of Theology** students must complete a minimum of 600 Units of Credit chosen from the courses listed in Appendix B:

- 50 Units of Credit from two (2) Core Curriculum Courses
- 350 Units of Credit from fourteen (14) theology electives
- 200 Units of Credit from eight (8) general elective courses

To be eligible for the award of **Bachelor of Theology (Honours)** students must complete a minimum of 200 Units of Credit as shown in Appendix A:

- 100 Units of Credit from four (4) compulsory courses
- 100 Units of Credit from PHTH Supervised Honours Philosophy and Theology

7.4 Theology Elective Courses:

Students enrolled in the **Diploma of Theology** are required to complete seven (7) theology elective courses. Theology elective courses can be selected from the list of courses in Appendix B.

Students enrolled in the **Associate Degree in Theology** are required to complete fourteen (14) theology elective courses. Theology elective courses can be selected from the list of courses in Appendix B.

Students enrolled in the **Bachelor of Theology** are required to complete fourteen (14) theology elective courses and eight (8) general elective courses. Theology elective courses can be selected from the list of courses in Appendix B.

There are no elective courses for Students enrolled in the **Bachelor of Theology (Honours)**.

7.5 Honours:

There are no additional requirements for the award of Bachelor of Theology (Honours) other than as stated above. These regulations should be read in conjunction with the Policy: The Award of a Degree with Honours.

7.6 Course substitutions:

Course substitutions are permitted but must be approved by the Dean.
