

Using Padlet

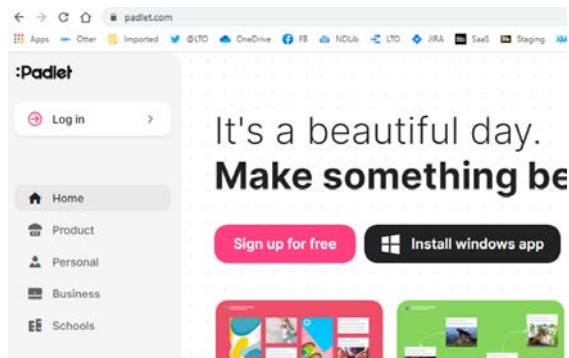
Padlet is a free online app that starts blank and allows you to create a [wall](#) (or [canvas](#), [shelf](#), [stream](#), [grid](#), [timeline](#), [map](#)) where students can collaborate and share ideas and resources. It works in any web browser and could also be used as an iPad app. [This padlet wall](#) contains some padlet tips and tricks.

You can ask your students to create their own padlet account for an individual task, or you can create a wall and share the link with your students so that they will be able to add to the group padlet wall anonymously without having to create an account or sign in.

A free padlet account will let you create up to three padlets and will accept up to 25MB of uploads. [This video](#) shows the steps that are listed below.

Create a Padlet account

1. Go to <https://padlet.com/> and select to **Sign up for free**



2. You can sign in with Google, Microsoft or Apple accounts, or simply create a new account using your email address. And yes, you are beautiful, so go on and tick that box.


Once your account is created, you will receive a confirmation email from folks@padlet.com:

3. Select the basic plan: it is free and lets you create three padlets and upload 25MB of data.



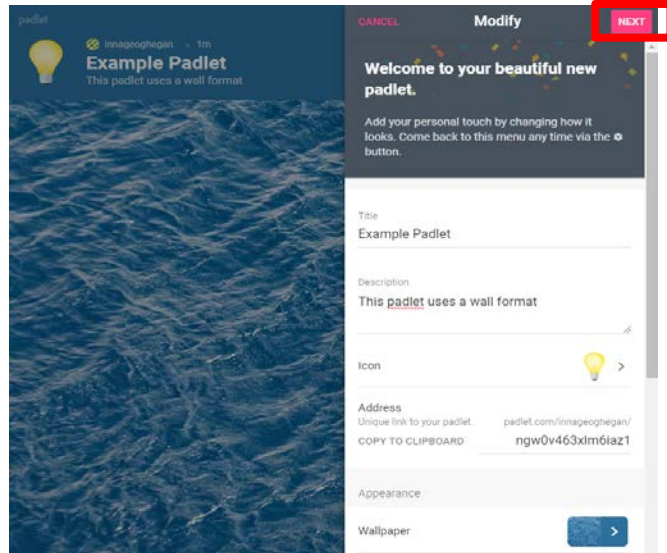
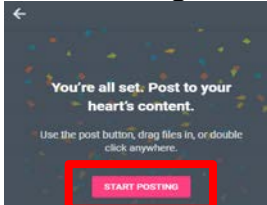
6. Select a format.
Here are the examples of padlets created with the use of different formats:
[wall](#), [canvas](#), [shelf](#), [stream](#), [grid](#), [timeline](#), [map](#).

Click on **Select** button under the format that you decided to use.

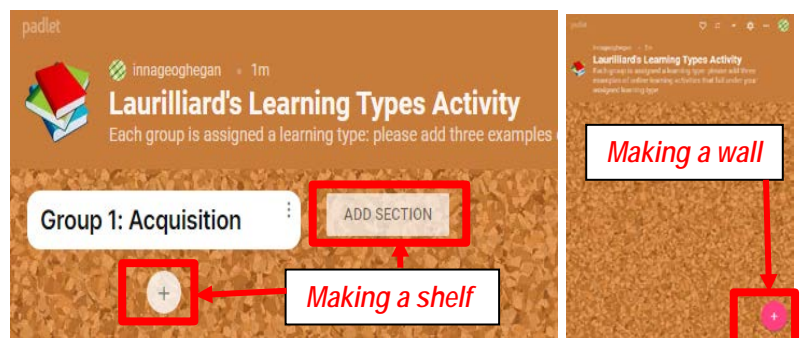

7. Make a variety of choices inside the padlet menu on the right: title, description, wallpaper, icon, allow (or not) attribution and commenting and so on.

Have fun playing and don't worry, you will be able to modify (or change entirely) everything later. Click on **Next** once done, and then on **Start Posting**:

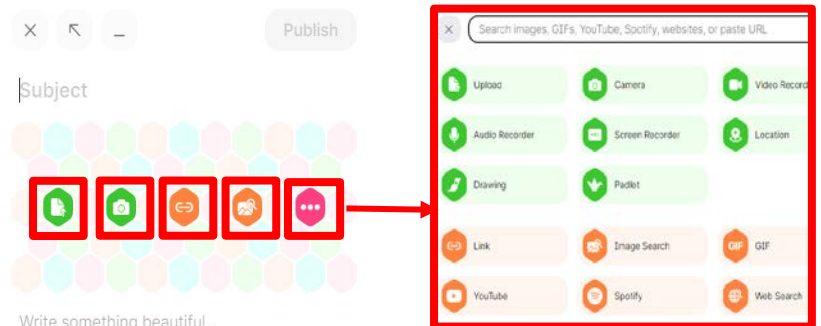


8. Exactly how you make your padlet will depend on the format that you selected. For example, the *shelf* format will ask you to name (and then add) a section (which becomes a title of the column). To add materials into each of the sections, click on the **plus**. If you are building a *wall*, the **plus** will be on the bottom right of the screen. Click on the plus to add materials.

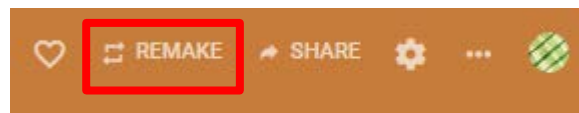


9. Play with adding materials – you can add subject and text, but also **upload**, take **photo**, **link**, do **image search** (see buttons on the right). The last button is **more** – and it opens up a lot of new possibilities.

You don't have to click on the plus if you are building a wall – simply **double-click anywhere on the page** to get the same options. You can also **drag the files** from your desktop (or from the File Explorer menu) and drop them into your padlet. Experiment!



10. Explore the options on top right. **Remake** will let you use a copy of a padlet that you like as a template for your own.




11. Share (and Privacy settings)



The default privacy setting is **Secret** (more formats are on the right): use it for group activities so that your students do not need their own padlet account and use the link to your padlet to add materials. Use the default **Can write** setting:

- Can read
Can view posts. Cannot add posts, edit and approve others' posts, modify and delete padlet, invite collaborators.
- Can write
Can view and add posts. Cannot edit and approve others' posts, modify and delete padlet, invite collaborators.
- Can edit
Can view and add posts, edit and approve others' posts. Cannot modify and delete padlet, invite collaborators.

Keep the padlet hidden from the public. If I choose to share it with someone, they should be able to access it.

Keep the padlet hidden from the public. If I choose to share it with someone, they should require a password to access it.

Keep the padlet hidden from the public. Only logged in users can access this padlet.

Secret
Keep the padlet hidden from the public. If I choose to share it with someone, they should be able to access it.

Public
Let the whole world see this padlet. Put it on my profile.


12. Modify



This is where you can change all of the settings from step 7: don't forget to **Save** any changes.

A word about **attribution**: do not use it if you use the Secret privacy level, a name of the author will just be shown as Anonymous.

If attribution is important, set up privacy to Members only (see picture on the right) – your students will have to create their own padlet accounts to log in.





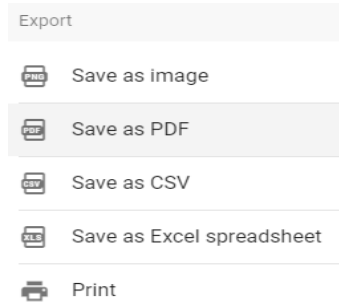

14. **Export:** either from **Share** or from **More**. Since you can only have 3 padlets for free, export the padlet (and save the exported file) once your activity with it is finished. Try different options to see how they work.



15. Home

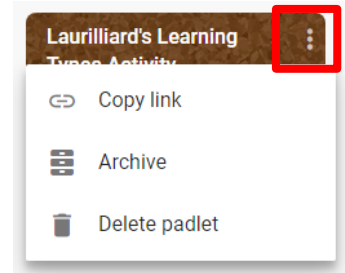
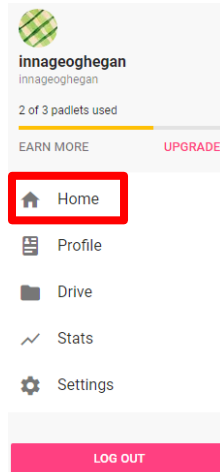


Home will take you to the Menu that you saw in step 5.

Archive (but you only have up to 25MB of space) or delete a used padlet by clicking on **Padlet Actions** menu (three vertical dots).

You can unarchive or delete the padlet that you previously archived.

To go back to the padlet, just click on it.



Using Padlet

Padlet is very versatile in terms of usage – it's great for brainstorming, ice-breaking, gathering student work, creating personal student portfolios, mind mapping, note-taking, as a discussion board alternative, and many more.
