3 PURPOSE

These Program Requirements set out the approved requirements for the Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours).

4 OVERVIEW

4.1 Campus Availability

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) has been approved for delivery on the Fremantle Campus and the Sydney Campus.

4.2 Student Availability

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) is available for enrolment to domestic Students and international Students with a student visa.

4.3 Australian Qualifications Framework

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) is a Level 8 AQF qualification.

4.4 Duration

The Volume of Learning for the Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) is four (4) years of equivalent full-time study. A student is not able to enrol on a part time basis. An accelerated mode is not available for these Awards.

4.5 Maximum Duration

The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) Award is 6 years (including any periods of approved leave of absence) from the date on which they were first enrolled into the program by the University.

4.6 Study Mode

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) is offered in Internal Study mode only.

4.7 Professional Accreditation

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) is in the process of being accredited by the Occupational Therapy Council Australia.

5 ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

5.1 University Admission Requirements

To be eligible for general admission to The University of Notre Dame Australia, all applicants must meet the <u>University's minimum requirements for admission</u>. The requirements for admission are detailed in the University's Policy: *Admissions*.

5.2 Specific Program Requirements for Admission

To be eligible for admission to the program additional entry requirements include:

- 5.2.1 School leavers are recommended to be studying ATAR course or equivalent in English and at least one ATAR course in the sciences that include physics, chemistry, human biology and/or physical education studies.
- 5.2.2 For non-school leavers, previous university studies are required for entry to these Awards.
- 5.2.3 The STAT is not applicable for entry to these Awards.
- 5.2.4 An alternative pathway for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander applicants is applicable for this Award
- 5.2.5 Any inherent requirements or components (such as evidence of performance capability in a particular field of study) that need to be met to ensure that the academic requirements and integrity of a Program or Course are maintained.

6 PRACTICUM OR INTERNSHIP REQUIREMENTS

- **6.1** Students are to complete a variety of formal practicum experiences within the clinical setting as a part of this Award commencing in Year 2, that includes a minimum of 1000 hours of practicum. The following courses are specific to clinical placement experiences:
 - OCTY2002 Participation in Diverse Communities
 - OCTY3004 Professional Practice A
 - OCTY4001 Professional Practice B
 - OCTY4003 Professional Practice C

7 PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

7.1 Program Description

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy is a 4-year full-time program that prepares graduates to become effective, culturally appropriate practitioners with a focus on the occupational therapist-client relationship as part of collaborative multi-disciplinary practice. This program includes a suite of occupational therapy-specific courses and clinical placement experiences to develop specialised knowledge and skills, enabling graduates to analyse critically, reflect on and synthesise complex information, problems, concepts, and theories. There is an advanced and integrated focus on ethical and professional communication and behaviours. Graduates of this program will have expertise in evidence-based and reflective practice fostering autonomous, adaptable occupational therapists well prepared to meet the challenges of current and future health provision across diverse practice settings. Graduates from this program will be eligible for registration as an occupational therapist with the Australian Health Practitioner Registration Agency (AHPRA).

7.2 Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the **Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours)** graduates will be able to:

- 1. Collaboratively apply effective, culturally safe verbal, non-verbal and written communication skills with clients, families, carers, and service providers
- 2. Practice professional and ethical behaviour, demonstrating respect and sensitivity to clients with diverse social, cultural, and spiritual beliefs
- 3. Reflects on limitations in knowledge, skills, and abilities in order to plan and implement lifelong learning strategies
- 4. Apply an ethically informed, evidence-based approach to occupational therapy practice by accessing, critically appraising, and implementing best available evidence
- 5. Demonstrate a broad range of knowledge and skills to practice safe, effective entry-level occupational therapy across a range of settings
- 6. Autonomously conduct effective assessment and critically analyse findings to formulate and prioritise occupational therapy practice
- 7. Develop and communicate occupational therapy-based health promotion and collaborative management strategies to empower clients to participate in healthcare decisions and behaviours
- 8. Contribute to healthcare delivery through culturally safe, effective inter-professional communication, advocacy, and practice
- 9. Apply coherent and advanced knowledge in an area developed through research and critical analysis of the relevant literature
- 10. Develop advanced knowledge, critical thinking, and technical skills to develop, conduct and report on project or research work independently and/or in collaboration with others.

7.3 Required Courses

To be eligible for the award of Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) students must complete a minimum of 800 Units of Credit chosen from the courses listed in Appendix A comprising:

50 Units of Credit from two (2) Core Curriculum Courses

650 Units of Credit from twenty-four (24) Compulsory Courses

100 Units of Credit from three (3) Compulsory Courses of either the Industry or Research streams

7.4 Elective Courses

There are no elective courses in the Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours).

7.5 Honours

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy Award is offered with Honours. Specific admission requirements for the Honours Award are detailed below and are to be read in conjunction with the Policy: The Award of a Degree with Honours.

7.5.1 Applicability of Honours program

The Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) is an embedded honours Award. All students accepted into the program are by default included in the Industry stream.

7.5.2 Admission to the Research stream

Admission to the Research stream of Honours program is by invitation (in accordance with School procedures) and is subject to approval by the Head of School.

7.5.3 Selection Criteria

- (a) A student who demonstrates an excellent level of performance during the first two years of the Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) will be considered for a place in the Research stream.
- (b) An excellent level of performance is considered to be a GPA of 3 and above.
- (c) For entry to the Research stream a student needs to maintain a Distinction average in Semester 1 of Year 3.
- (d) A student who is accepted into the Research stream enrols in the required courses in Semester 2 of Year 3 of the program.
- (e) In discussion with members of staff, a suitably qualified student will submit a topic for consideration as an Honours research project. A student needs to arrange for a supervisor for the topic and gain the approval of the Head of School for this research.
- (f) Final acceptance into the Research stream is at the discretion of the Head of School, based on availability of a suitable supervision arrangement and availability of resources.

7.5.4 Awarding Honours

Honours within this Award is awarded in accordance with the General Regulations and is awarded as a Graded Honours.

7.6 Course substitutions

There are no approved course substitutions permitted in this Award.
