It is because of their hard work that we have managed to get to where we are today. I know that with their continued dedication, the backing of our Notre Dame community and the guidance of our Strategic Plan, we will be able to build the strong and bright future we are striving for.

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Message from the Vice Chancellor

The Australian Government's latest Student Experience Survey once again ranked Notre Dame as one of the highest performing universities nationally for the undergraduate student experience.

Our unwavering mission at The University of Notre Dame Australia is to help form our students so they can play full and active roles in society.

The five pillars of our 2022-2026 Strategic Plan — universality, education for the common good, transformative research, integrating practice and knowledge and integral human development — will ensure Notre Dame continues its distinctive journey of excellence and impact as a Catholic university.

To achieve our bold vision, we must continue to take important steps to deliver financial stability and sustainability.

The University finished 2022 in a surplus position for the second successive year. This was the result of hard work from staff all across the University and prudent financial management, amid a softening domestic student recruitment market, border closure decisions, and a strong economy and labour market.

At this juncture, I want to acknowledge and thank the University's staff for their tireless dedication and commitment to our University and its students. I would also like to recognise the continued support of the University's Directors, Trustees and Governors.

In 2022, enrolments across the sector were down by 6 per cent on average, and this was a challenge for Notre Dame also. Despite the shifting recruiting environment, Notre Dame was able to respond in a manner that positioned the University for growth in 2023 and beyond.

We are embracing opportunities to diversify our revenue base through the development of new program offerings and expansion into new markets, all the while ensuring our focus remains on supporting our students and providing them an outstanding university experience and education. As such, we will continue to invest into our national learning, teaching and research facilities and drive improvements in our technology infrastructure.

New undergraduate and postgraduate programs were introduced across the country, particularly in critical professions facing severe labour shortages, including essential areas such as nursing, aged and disability care, allied health, school education and early childhood education; new paramedicine programs were developed, which have been positively received, and a new online postgraduate qualification that will advance the careers of health professionals and meet industry demand for skilled leaders. Furthermore, a fast-tracked teacher training program for teachers wanting to specialise in early learning was also rolled out. Students who already hold a diploma in early childhood studies may now obtain the degree in just two years (instead of three).

The Australian Government's latest Student Experience Survey once again ranked Notre Dame as one of the highest performing universities nationally for the undergraduate student experience.

The University was ranked fifth in the country for the quality of the entire undergraduate educational experience, and gains were made in teaching quality, learner engagement, learning resources and skills development.

Notre Dame retained all five-star rankings across thirteen undergraduate and postgraduate categories for student experience and graduate outcomes in the latest Good Universities Guide. For undergraduate experience, five-star rankings were given in the categories of overall educational experience, learning engagement, skills development, student support, teaching quality, full-time employment and starting salary.

For postgraduate studies, five stars were awarded for overall educational experience, learning engagement, skills development, teaching quality, full-time employment and starting salary. For the overall educational experience, Notre Dame is ranked second and third in the country, respectively, for undergraduate and postgraduate offerings.

In 2022, the work of our researchers changed the lives of people locally, in remote and regional areas of Australia, and worldwide.

In an Australian first, our researchers trialled a new cervical screening program in the Kimberley region of Western Australia, enabling medical staff to travel to remote communities with the latest portable testing equipment in a bid to reduce unacceptably high rates of cervical cancer.

Notre Dame researchers also developed a world-first eye screening system that uses artificial intelligence to detect eye diseases that can cause blindness, and they worked on a ground-breaking study that revealed increased screening for a potentially fatal heart condition that could save more than 10,000 Australian lives each year.

Beyond the health field, a team of our researchers taught us that the amount of plastic waste washing up in Cockburn Sound south of Perth had more than halved since bans on some single-use plastics were introduced.

And finally, hair samples collected from the graves of some of Perth's earliest residents gave us a glimpse back in time at the health of people from the gold rush era, while another study conducted by Notre Dame investigators found regular gym sessions were the key to improving golfing performance for people with age-related aches and pains.

Over the course of 2022, Notre Dame continued to forge partnerships across the globe.

We were delighted to enter into a landmark student exchange agreement with the University of Notre Dame in the United States, helping us become a more highly connected international institution. We became a member of their prestigious Global Gateway Network, opening opportunities for our students to study in the US, London and Jerusalem, and for more international students to visit our Australian campuses.

Visits to the Catholic University of Paris, St Mary's University College, Belfast and St Mary's University, London also opened the possibilities of offering joint degrees, study exchanges, guest lectures, joint international conferences and research projects.

Further advances were made in providing a Notre Dame education and experience to all.

The Australian Government awarded the University 600 new equity places, which will allow more students to pursue higher education, especially those from underrepresented cohorts including regional and remote, Indigenous and first-in-family. This will help us to further grow the national workforce in key professions such as nursing, teaching and allied health.

An important new partnership was established with the Clontarf Foundation, aiming to encourage more Indigenous students to pursue a university education. Clontarf Academy students were welcomed onto campus, where they were given a first-hand insight into university life.

In partnership with Sydney Catholic Schools and All Saints Catholic College, Liverpool, we launched a new initiative to provide additional support and guidance to students from across Western Sydney who aspire to a university education. The new Student Support Centre at All Saints College provides students with dedicated advice and support on university opportunities and pathways.

Technology and cyber security upgrades were a feature of 2022.

A trusted and secure technology foundation was developed that will ensure the safety and integrity of our digital assets; a reflection of our commitment to providing a world-class education in a secure digital environment. Key security programs were implemented, a number of teaching spaces were upgraded and new laptops were rolled out to professional and academic staff across all campuses.

We completed major building works to enhance the student experience, provide access to state-of-the-art technology and improve safety. New nursing simulation labs with screen mirror technology and skills assessment cameras were delivered across Fremantle and Sydney to support increased Commonwealth supported places. Prindiville Hall in Fremantle was upgraded to meet the needs of students, a new CCTV network was installed across all our campuses, and new biomedical laboratories, accommodation offerings in Kununurra and a Fremantle physiotherapy gym were all delivered.

Recognising supporters of the University.

This year marked 30 years of the Knights of the Southern Cross Education Foundation, which has supported hundreds of teachers to undertake further studies in religious education and philosophy at Notre Dame. The Knights are a major benefactor and have contributed more than \$2.2 million towards a range of programs since the University was founded. We are extremely grateful for their continued support.

We were delighted to award Honorary Doctorates to the Governor of New South Wales, Her Excellency the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC KC, in recognition of her outstanding contribution to judiciary and the law, and Reverend Monsignor Kevin Long in honour of his exceptional service to the University and the Catholic Church.

This year was one of growth and progress for the University. But there is still much more to do. We have ambitious goals for the future and a clear plan for how to achieve them – one that requires fresh thinking and innovation. It is an exciting time to be part of the Notre Dame community, and I look forward to building on our success and working together to bring our ideas and plans to fruition in the coming years.

- Our Core Curriculum will have an international component. We will offer the Core Curriculum beyond our campuses and provide our students the opportunity to undertake a period of time studying abroad with a partner institution. Students will gain perspective on the universality and unity of the truth and how it manifests across disciplines and in different cultural contexts.
- Each Faculty will be working with international university partners to codesign and co-deliver joint degrees.
- International experiences will be available to students across all programs.
- 12.5 per cent of our student population will be international by 2026, achieved with our international university and research partners.

Educating for the Common Good

Interdisciplinary learning recognising the unity of knowledge and contributing confidence to act and serve

- We will enhance our Core Curriculum to serve as the basis of the integration across all disciplines.
- All undergraduate programs will have a pathway, postgraduate and microcredential/short course option.
- Each Faculty will have at least two joint international degree programs.
- A greater number of students will have broadened their learning experiences by pursuing interdisciplinary and nested awards.1

- Reconciliation Action Plans will be developed, embraced and embedded, tailored for each campus.
- Improvements will have been made across our operations based on the goals of Laudato Si'², with a focus on achieving Net Zero emissions, energy, water, and waste reduction targets per campus.
- Action having been taken to ensure all our investments and practices are ethical.
- All staff will have been encouraged to engage in personal formation and community activities.

A new Core Curriculum




