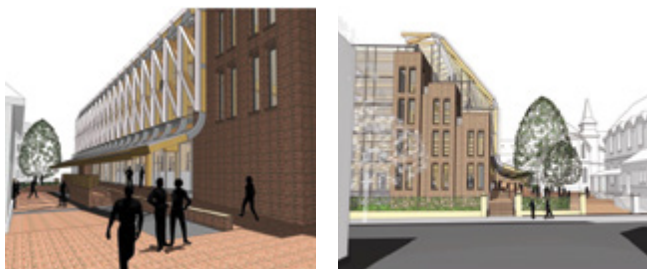

A bigger, more-connected Sydney Campus

Notre Dame is making an ambitious multi-million dollar investment in our Broadway Campus in Sydney, connecting our existing site with new spaces which will be home to new facilities for students, modern teaching spaces, better amenities and will expand our campus by more than 6,000 square metres.

The development will deliver an exciting new heart for the Broadway Campus in one of Sydney's most vibrant areas, with a strong focus on improving the experience of our students. The expansion will also create better flow and access across the Broadway Campus, supporting our commitment to fostering a collaborative educational community in one of Sydney's most dynamic areas.



Student Support Hub

Home to the Prospective Students Office, a tech hub and general student support, the Student Support Hub is a central space for students in all disciplines.



New facilities for nursing and health sciences

Nursing students have their own newly redeveloped facilities as part of the Broadway Campus. This new space is home to state-of-the-art simulation labs, technology for hands-on learning, new classrooms and student-specific spaces for both quiet study and group work.

The brand-new facilities also include kitchens, change rooms and secure bicycle storage. This new building in vibrant Chippendale is surrounded by great food, shopping, tree-lined streets and other amenities in the heart of Sydney. It is a short walk from both Central and Redfern train stations.

Health sciences students also have newly refurbished learning spaces a short walk from the Broadway Campus, with classrooms, labs and gym environments providing practical learning environments.



St Benedict's

St Benedict's is a vibrant, student-centred space which combines study areas with spaces for events, productions and socialising. The building includes a range of teaching and lecture rooms, a theatre room, computer lab and communications lab, as well as ample bicycle parking in the courtyard. St Ben's Hall is situated on level 1 overlooking the courtyard. St Benedict's is also home to Student Life (situated on the ground floor), the School of Arts & Sciences and the Chaplaincy Convener's Office.

St Benedict's Library

This recently updated space offers students a comprehensive library experience. Not only is it home to an extensive library collection, it includes meeting rooms, quiet study spaces and collaborative areas. Individual workstations include monitor docking stations and power charge points to ensure students can maximise their study time. The library also has shower facilities and bicycle parking out the front for students wishing to go green when travelling to our campus.



School of Law & Business

Notre Dame's School of Law & Business on the Broadway Campus consists of two main teaching spaces. There is also a moot court as part of our Mountain Street facilities which allows students to hone their litigation skills in a simulated courtroom environment.

Darlinghurst

Notre Dame's Darlinghurst Campus is home to our budding health professionals, training for careers in medicine and other health-related roles. As such, the campus facilities support training for these professions.



New simulation laboratory/wards

Three new simulation labs/wards, including associated prep areas and stores, have been built for our medical students. All are fitted with new audio-visual technology, including digital touch panel screens, tutorial recording and broadcast.



Proximity to St Vincent's Hospital

Notre Dame's Darlinghurst Campus is located next door to St Vincent's Hospital, which allows our medical students easy access to state-of-the-art facilities to apply their knowledge and skills to real-world scenarios, and to be mentored by health professionals.

Master's or doctoral international students with school-aged children

Dependants of master's by research or doctoral students are not required to pay public school tuition fees for accompanying dependant students for the duration of their postgraduate study period. The tuition fee waiver only applies when the visa holders are currently enrolled in full-time postgraduate studies at a recognised Western Australian university. The tuition fee waiver does not apply before or after the study period e.g. an English language program, bachelor's degree. During this time the dependant is a full fee payer.

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10 things to do around Perth

1. Discover Fremantle city

Locals affectionately call it 'Freo'. The city is not only home to the University's Perth Campus, but also a charming and eclectic place to discover, with beautiful and historic buildings, waterfront restaurants, cafés, breweries and much more.

2. Stroll around Elizabeth Quay

Set on the banks of the Swan River, this beautiful waterfront precinct is the perfect place to take a stroll, stop for a bite to eat or learn about the Dreaming stories of the Aboriginal people.

3. Relax in Kings Park

One of the largest inner-city parks in the world, Kings park overlooks the Perth city skyline and breathtaking Swan River. It's the perfect spot for you to sit back and enjoy this stunning natural landmark.

4. Watch the sunset at Cottesloe Beach

One of 19 pristine coastal spots lining the city's shoreline, Cottesloe is a favourite among locals and visitors alike, offering the perfect setting for an afternoon swim and a stunning Indian Ocean sunset.

5. Swim at Wadjemup/ Rottnest Island

Just a short ferry ride from Perth or Fremantle, Rottnest Island is a must-see with its picture-perfect beaches and its cute quokkas. Ideal for a daytrip or a longer stay vacation.

6. Immerse yourself in culture and arts in Northbridge

A dynamic area known for its arts and culture, Northbridge and its restaurants and bars come alive at night. Northbridge is also home to WA Museum Boola Bardip, the Art Gallery of Western Australia and Heath Ledger Theatre. Each year it is the central hub for Perth's Fringe World Festival and Perth Festival.

7. Take a drive to the Swan Valley and sample some of the best wines

Western Australia's oldest wine region is just a 25-minute car ride from the Perth city centre. The Swan Valley is the perfect place to take a Sunday drive, following the Swan Valley Food and Wine Trail to sample award-winning wines and gourmet delights such as cheeses, preserves, ice-cream and chocolate.

Venture out of Perth

8. Swim with dolphins in Rockingham

Between September and June, you can enjoy the unique experience of swimming with wild dolphins in the sheltered waters of Rockingham, just 40 minutes south of Perth.

9. Take a road trip down south

Ranked by Lonely Planet as one of the 30 best places in the world to visit in 2023, Western Australia's South West region – including Margaret River and Cape Naturaliste – boasts pristine forests, spectacular beaches, award-winning wineries and world-class restaurants waiting to be discovered.

10. Swim with the whale sharks on Australia's Coral Coast

North of Perth is where you will find turquoise waters, pristine islands nestled against wildflowers and a quintessential outback landscape. Drive to the world heritage listed Ningaloo Reef and you could have the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to swim with the majestic whale sharks, the largest known fish in the world.

The Walyalup Koort development hosts an array of eateries and entertainment options including bowling and mini golf. Then there is Bathers Beach, only a few steps from campus, which makes the perfect getaway on those long summer days.

Schools

Featuring heritage buildings and leafy courtyards, Notre Dame's Perth Campus provides a welcoming social hub in the heart of historic Fremantle. The campus has around 40 buildings located in the West End to serve our growing student population. The Perth Campus is the foundation campus and is home to our School of Nursing & Midwifery, School of Health Sciences, School of Medicine, School of Arts & Sciences, School of Law & Business, School of Education and School of Philosophy & Theology.

Transport

Just minutes from the Fremantle CBD, the campus is only a short walk from the Fremantle train station and busport. From there, it's a 30-minute train ride to Perth city, with buses running regularly to suburbs across Perth.

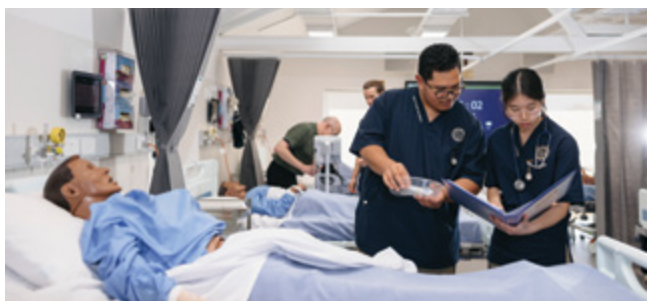

Campus facilities

Perth

Notre Dame's Perth Campus has around 40 buildings and houses faculties and schools from across the University's whole suite of disciplines. The campus has a range of state-of-the-art facilities, with a number recently upgraded to support our health sciences, physiotherapy, medical and nursing students in their training for the professions.



New simulation laboratory and wards

Three new simulation labs and wards have been built for our medical, nursing and health sciences students. All are fitted with new audio-visual technology, including digital touch panel screens, tutorial recording and broadcast, plus individual bed recording for skills assessments.

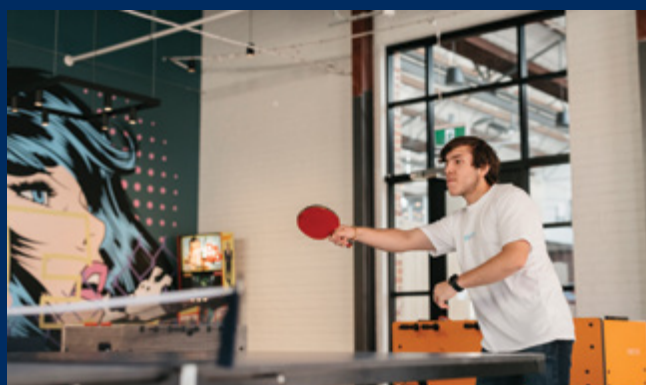
We have also invested in state-of-the-art new nursing and midwifery training facilities that simulate the high-pressure environment of a real-world hospital to ensure our graduates are more job ready. Along with advanced diagnostic and treatment equipment, the labs feature high-fidelity training mannequins that can speak, groan or scream in pain, breathe, have a pulse, blood pressure, veins for injecting medications, and can even mimic medical emergencies such as a cardiac arrest.



Health sciences and physio gyms

Two updated gymnasiums and health sciences labs are available for our physiotherapy and health sciences students, with state-of-the-art 3D high-definition video capture technology.





Prindiville Hall

Recently refurbished, the new space provides numerous facilities to students including a home for the Student Association, student groups and committees, meeting rooms, quiet study spaces, a brand new kitchen facility, open plan lounge and break out areas and a new arcade games room.

Prindiville Hall complements the University's Library and more formal learning areas as it offers modern spaces to serve less formal learning and meeting purposes.



Biomedical science labs

Blending historic character with modern innovation, this heritage-listed building is home to three state-of-the-art biomedical laboratories supporting teaching and learning across biomedical science and related disciplines.

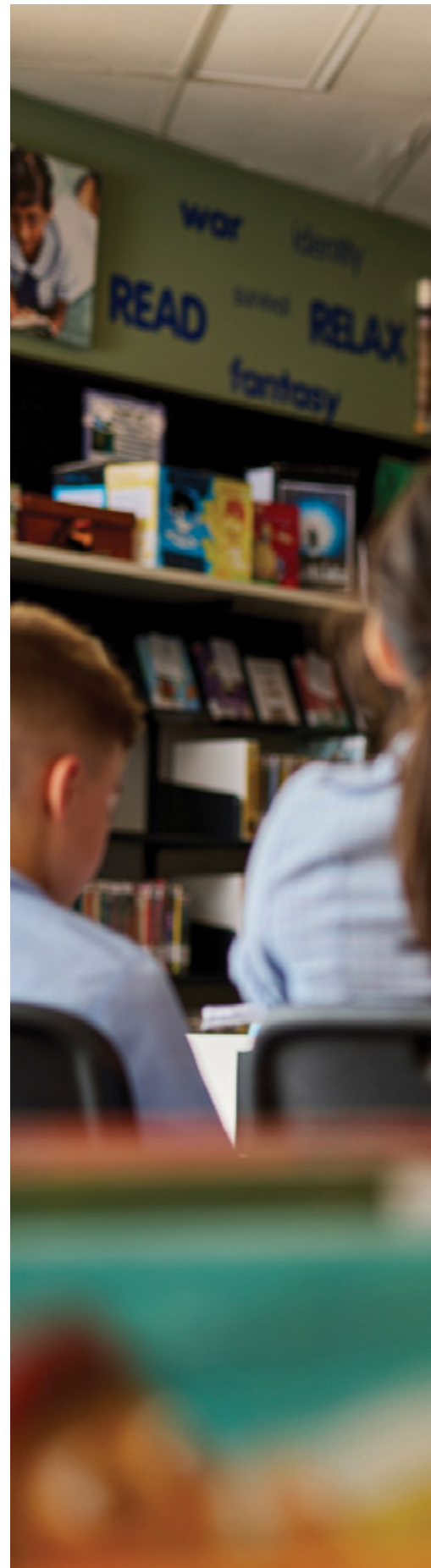

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Research institutes and centres

Institute for Ethics & Society

The Institute for Ethics & Society conducts research that aims to improve contemporary social, political and individual life by exploring how the virtues can strengthen civil society and support human flourishing; life, death and the care we receive; and the role of religion and spirituality in political and personal life.

We're a cross-disciplinary team of moral philosophers, bioethicists and social scientists who partner with a wide range of industry and community groups – from schools and hospitals to grassroots political and religious organisations – and we pursue excellence in research, public engagement and ethics education.

Part of the Institute for Ethics and Society, the **Centre for Technology and Human Futures** hosts human-focused research on AI and emerging technologies, exploring their implications for how we work, teach, play, understand ourselves and relate to one another.

Institute for Health Research

Collaborating with partners within the University, the health sector and research agencies, the Institute for Health Research (IHR) supports and drives innovative research to address the health needs of vulnerable individuals. Researchers at the IHR are leaders in the utilisation of artificial intelligence to prevent cardiovascular events and manage cardiovascular risk in the context of climate change. The research program of the IHR also addresses the health needs of individuals experiencing homelessness, end-of-life care, recovery from injury, and complex health research methodologies and analyses. Staff at the IHR are committed to supporting the educational and professional development of students pursuing a master's or PhD by research and to providing a vibrant and supportive environment dedicated to high-quality research designed to enhance the health and wellbeing of our community.

Nulungu Research Institute

The Nulungu Research Institute focuses on five core research themes – Culture Country and Language; Transformative Learning; Aboriginal Wellbeing; Sustainable Lifeways and Social Justice; and Policy, Practice, Evaluation – within a context of valuing Aboriginal knowledge. Based at the University of Notre Dame Australia in Broome, a Campus of Reconciliation, our research is guided by our collective vision: To conduct collaborative research which is transformative, decolonising and of value to Aboriginal people with a focus on the Kimberley.

A key feature of Nulungu's research profile is impactful, community-driven collaborative projects with national and international academic institutions, teaching and research communities, government and industry.

Centre for the History of Philosophy

The Notre Dame Centre for the History of Philosophy is a leading Australian centre for research into philosophical traditions from the ancient world to the present day. Our researchers specialise in ancient philosophy and philosophy within the Abrahamic traditions, leading externally funded projects and contributing to international scholarship in these fields. The Centre publishes with leading journals and academic presses, supervises master's and PhD candidates, hosts visiting scholars and public events, and collaborates with research partners in Australia and around the world, including through the History of Philosophy Forum at the University of Notre Dame (US).

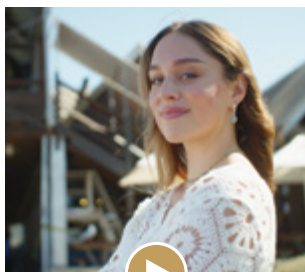

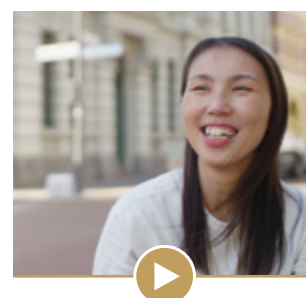

Literacy and Numeracy Testing for Initial Teacher Education students (LANTITE)

Education students who will teach in schools are required to successfully achieve the standard of both literacy and numeracy components of the Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education students (LANTITE). Students must sit both components in the first year of their studies and have passed both components prior to undertaking final teaching internship. The LANTITE is administered externally by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER) and students will be required to register with ACER and pay for the test.

Teacher Performance Assessment

All students are required to successfully complete the Graduate Teacher Performance Assessment as part of their final teaching internship.

Professional accreditation

The Bachelor of Primary Education and Bachelor of Secondary Education degrees are both fully accredited with the Teacher Registration Board of Western Australia and approved by the New South Wales Education Standards Authority, so graduates are eligible to apply for registration with the relevant organisation and be legally employed as teachers in either state.

Our Bachelor of Early Childhood Education is accredited by The Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority.

Orientation Week is a fun, festival-like event and is an opportunity to meet fellow students and get involved in student life at the University.

Orientation Week is compulsory for international students studying on campus in Australia, as it provides you with important information which will help set you up for success during your studies at the University.



LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

English language entry requirements

The University requires applicants to demonstrate English language competency of the appropriate level stipulated for their nominated degree. Successful completion of specified secondary or tertiary education in English may be used to demonstrate competency, depending on your chosen degree.

All English language tests are valid for two years from date of completion.

- Academic International English Language Testing System (IELTS)
- Teaching of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)
- Cambridge Academic English (CAE)
- Pearson Test for English Academic (PTE)
- Occupational English Test (OET)

Note: Not all tests can be used to prove English language proficiency for all degrees. The University reserves the right to ask any applicant to sit any English language proficiency test.

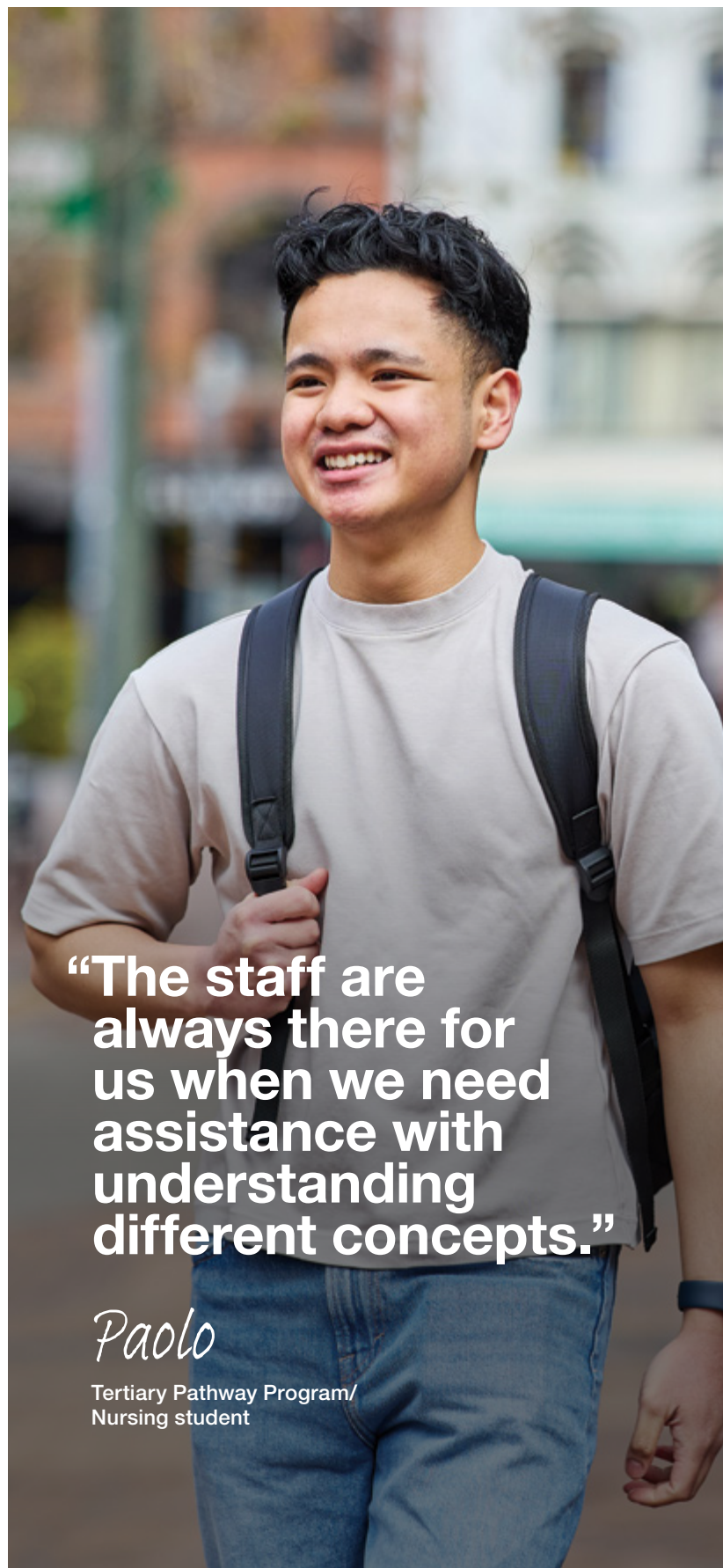

Fee information

Overseas Student Health Cover

The Australian Government requires international students to have adequate medical insurance or health cover from an Australian Health Fund. There are currently six providers approved by the Australian Government: Bupa Australia, AHM OSHC, Allianz Global Assistance, Medibank Private, CBHS International Health and NIB OSHC.

The University of Notre Dame Australia partners with Bupa Australia as our preferred provider. Bupa is Australia's largest healthcare provider. All new international students enrolled at the University will be covered by this provider, unless proof of other cover is provided. The costs of your Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) are invoiced to you for payment with your first year's fees before you arrive in Australia.

OSHC is effective from one week before Orientation Week and is valid for the length of your visa, so you will not need to worry about renewing your cover while you are studying. If you intend to arrive in Australia before the cover starts, please notify the International Office so that appropriate health cover can be arranged.

If you change or extend your study program, it is your responsibility to ensure that you remain covered as long as the length of your visa. If you do not have sufficient OSHC coverage, your visa could be cancelled and you will not be covered for any medical bills that you incur during the lapsed time.

Tuition fees

Notre Dame's tuition costs depend upon a student's study load and discipline of the courses being studied. An average full-time study load is eight courses per year, or four courses per semester with some Schools requiring completion of more courses as the standard full-time load. Fees are payable each semester, at least four weeks prior to the commencement date of the student's program. However, MBA students will pay their fees each term, as the program is delivered in terms. notredame.edu.au/international/fees.

Please note, tuition fees are subject to change each year.

Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF)

The Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) invests in new opportunities and services that improve the experience of all Notre Dame students.

The SSAF funds non-academic services across all campuses, based on feedback from our students on the services they value the most – from student advocacy and advice to student wellbeing, or clubs and societies. Incidental fees and additional study costs

The additional costs of study will vary from student to student. These include textbooks, uniforms (for example nursing or physiotherapy programs), photocopying and stationery. These costs are in addition to tuition fees.

Some degrees have costs in addition to Tuition Fees. These may vary depending upon the individual courses chosen. Examples of incidental (non-tuition) fees include uniforms, specialist equipment, field trips and immunisations. During your studies

Complaints and grievances

The ESOS framework

The Education Services for Overseas Students Act 2000 (ESOS Act) protects the interests of international students by setting out standards for education providers. These standards include requirements for the University related to educational resources, facilities, the recruitment and placement of students and staff capabilities. It also offers students financial protection in case the University of Notre Dame Australia does not deliver what it has promised you.

Cancellation or suspension of enrolment

The University of Notre Dame Australia retains the right to cancel or suspend a student's enrolment. The University is required to report a student to the Department of Home Affairs via PRISMS in a number of circumstances.

International students must be aware of their visa conditions, their roles and responsibilities during their time studying at Notre Dame University. For further information about student visa conditions, reporting to the Department of Home Affairs, roles and responsibilities, and more detail relevant to the University's cancellation policies, and the grounds on which a student's enrolment can be cancelled or suspended, please refer to **POLICY-International-Students.pdf** and **Procedure-Intervention-Strategy.pdf**.

Leave of absence or deferral

An international student on a student visa is only permitted to take leave/defer under very limited circumstances, on the grounds of compassionate or compelling circumstances (for example, an extended illness which affects your ability to study, bereavement, a disaster in your home country requiring your return or a traumatic experience which affects your ability to study).

To apply you must complete the following:

- Leave of Absence form (available at Student Administration Office).
- Original Medical Certificate or supporting documentation to support the Leave of Absence.
- Intervention Strategy form (liaise with your School to prepare this form).
- Statement in writing (addressed to the Campus Registrar who will consult with the Dean of your School).

These documents need to be submitted to your School for approval first. Then the School will forward all the paperwork to the Student Administration Office for final processing and approval.

As highlighted in the National Code of Practice for Providers of Education and Training to Overseas Students 2018, Standard 9:

- There is no maximum period for a deferral under compassionate or compelling reasons, but the deferral must be assessed in accordance with the registered providers' policies and procedures.

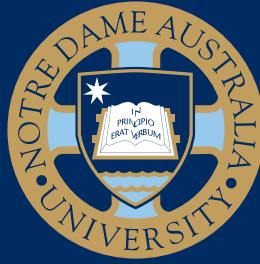
