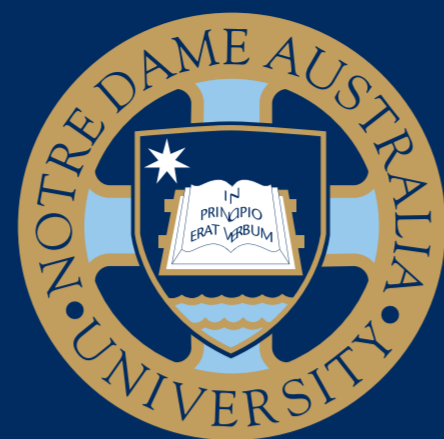
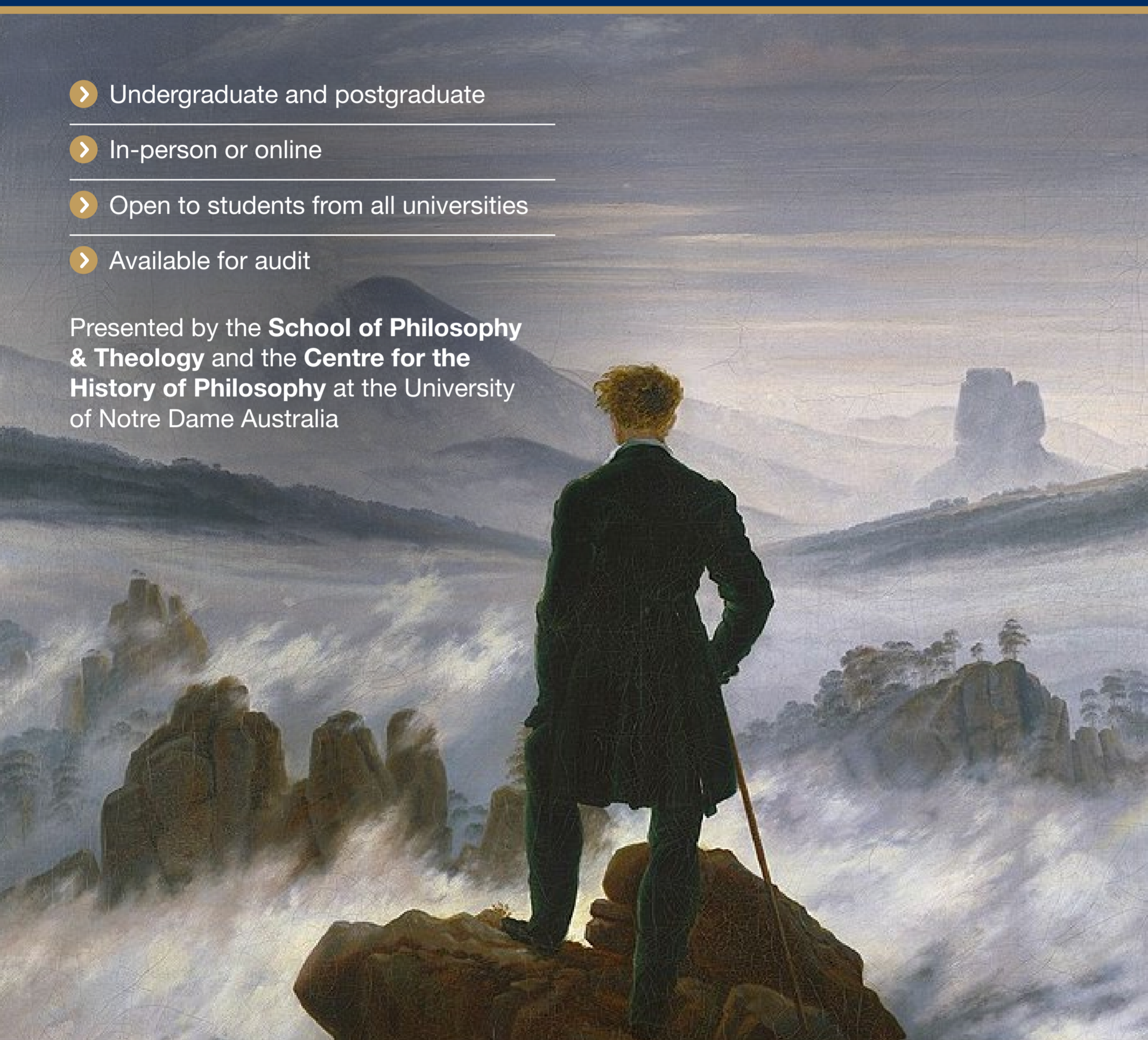

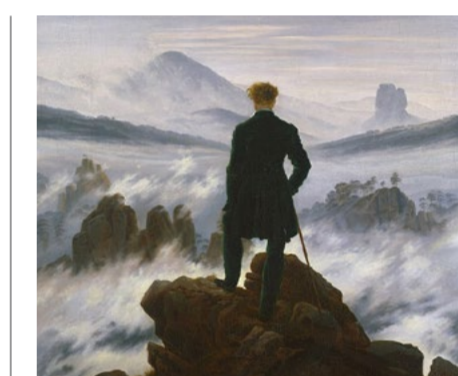
Medieval Philosophy

5th – 15th century
