If you want to pursue a career in politics, become a diplomat or be a part of Government policymaking, The University of Notre Dame Australia's Bachelor of Arts with a Major in Politics and International Relations is your degree. As the world becomes more interconnected and traditional alliances shift and fragment, Australia's political institutions are under more significant pressure. Our degree will teach you about Australia's political history, its decision-making procedures and how we operate on the international stage.

Why study this major?

Studying Australian politics and international relations is valuable training for anyone who wishes to pursue a career in politics, diplomacy, journalism, and Governmental policymaking. You will cover a wide range of issues you might encounter in your career. This includes exploring terrorism, climate change, the global economy, media and politics and Australia's foreign policy.

This three-year degree is divided into three main streams: Australian Politics, International Relations, and Political Theory. While all students acquire a thorough knowledge of Australia's political institutions in the first year, you will have the opportunity to pursue more specialist topics in Years Two and Three, with options including US Foreign Policy, The Middle East, Terrorism and Intelligence and Australian Foreign Policy.

Upon graduation, you will have a sophisticated understanding of Australian politics and the world of international diplomacy. Furthermore, the superior research, analytical, and communication skills you accrued during the program will put you in good stead in the workplace.

Fees and costs

This Program has the following loan scheme(s) available for eligible students:

CSP

A Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) is a place at university where the government pays part of your fees. This part is a subsidy, not a loan, and you don't have to pay it back.

However, this subsidy does not cover the entire cost of your study. Students must pay the rest, called the 'student contribution amount'.

In a Commonwealth Supported Place, your fees are subsidised by the Australian Government. Your fees will be split into two portions:

- The Commonwealth contribution, which is the portion paid by the Australian Government.
- The student contribution, which is the portion you pay. You may choose to pay upfront or defer your student contribution with a HECS-HELP Loan.

Eligible students will be offered a CSP – you do not need to apply.

HECS-HELP

The HECS-HELP loan scheme assists eligible students with the payment of all, or part, of their tuition fees, not including additional study costs such as accommodation or textbooks. Your HECS-HELP debt will be indexed each year in line with the Consumer Price Index.
