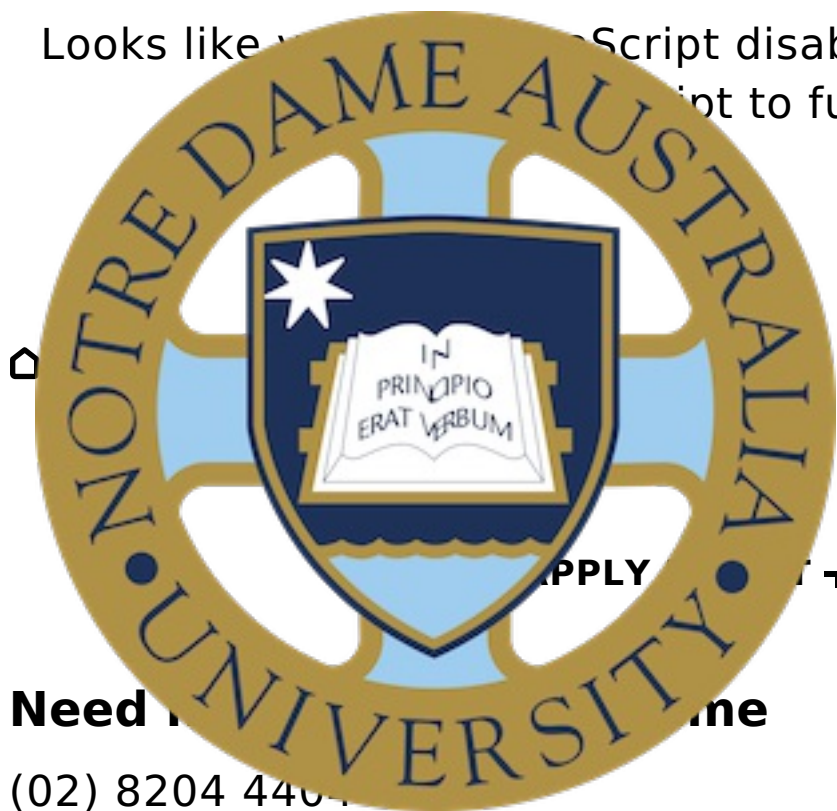

Master of Primary Teaching

School of Education

Are you a graduate who would like to become a primary school teacher? This Master of Primary Teaching will allow you to teach in public, independent and Catholic schools across Australia. The program is highly flexible and will therefore suit the needs of students who have work and family commitments, with many classes taught in the evenings and on weekends.

Why study this degree?

Completed over eighteen months of full-time study (2yr FTE), our Master of Primary Teaching is aimed at students who already hold a Bachelor's degree but wish to gain the required skills and knowledge to become a primary school teacher. You are probably already aware of Notre Dame's excellent reputation for producing job-ready graduates and this Master's program is an excellent example, with students spending a total of 14 weeks working in a classroom setting.

We have designed this degree program so that you can combine your studies with existing work and family commitments. Most of the classes at our Broadway site are taught in the evenings or on weekends.

Regardless of what you studied for your Bachelor's degree, this Master's program provides a solid pedagogical grounding for your future career in teaching. Over the course of your studies, you will study subjects such as English, history, science, mathematics, technology and geography as well as learning the fundamentals of research methodology in Year Two.

In addition, you will be required to enrol in and pay to sit the National Literacy and Numeracy Test for Initial Teacher Education Students (LANTITE). Students must pass both the literacy and numeracy components of the test before they progress to Year Two of this program.

Entry requirements

Applicants for this program must hold a Bachelor's degree from a recognised higher education provider. Students who have English as an additional language and are admitted on the basis of an International English Language Testing System (IELTS) assessment, or an equivalent English language proficiency assessment, are only admitted if they have attained an overall score of 7.5 in IELTS Academic, with no score lower than 8.0 in speaking and listening, and no score lower than 7.0 in reading and writing.

Learning outcomes

Upon successful completion of the Master of Primary Teaching graduates will be able to:

1. Apply evidence-based learning and teaching approaches that demonstrate expert judgement in being inclusive of all learners
2. Analyse and synthesise relevant curriculum to design and implement pedagogy that responds to a diverse range of learners
3. Apply advanced literacy and numeracy knowledge and skill across all curricular areas;
4. Demonstrate an advanced and integrated understanding of scholarly practice to extend professional understanding through inquiry and research
5. Establish dispositions of critical reflection to continually improve the teaching and learning cycle
5. Integrate creative, effective, and contemporary information and communication technologies to enhance learning
7. Interpret student data to design and implement authentic assessment to report on and improve student learning

Practical component

Students will complete approximately 14 weeks of professional experience in a range of settings which are embedded in the following courses:

- Professional Experience 1 (approximately 4 weeks)
- Internship and Transition to Teaching (approximately 10 weeks)

Career opportunities

With a Master of Primary Teaching, you can teach primary students in Australian Catholic, Independent and Government schools, depending on your teaching specialisation. Career opportunities within the education system include Lead teacher, faculty or year group coordinator, principal, and assistant principal.

Real world experience

You will learn from academics who are industry leaders and, through our practicum placements, you will gain real professional experience and make valuable contacts with potential employers.

Professional accreditation

The Master of Primary Teaching is accredited by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA).

Fees and costs

This Program has the following loan scheme(s) available for eligible students:

Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP)

A Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) is a place at a university where the Australian Government pays part of your fees. This part is a subsidy, not a loan, and you don't have to pay it back. However, this subsidy does not cover the entire cost of your study. Students must pay the rest, which is called the 'student contribution amount'.

In a Commonwealth Supported Place, your fees are subsidised by the Australian Government. Your fees will be split into two portions:

The Commonwealth contribution, which is the portion paid by the Australian Government.

The student contribution, which is the portion you pay. You may choose to pay upfront or defer your student contribution with a HECS-HELP Loan. The [HECS-HELP loan scheme \(https://www.studyassist.gov.au/preview-link/node/106/5de65e70-6656-4297-a79d-19fd4a6deadd\)](https://www.studyassist.gov.au/preview-link/node/106/5de65e70-6656-4297-a79d-19fd4a6deadd) assists eligible students with the payment of all, or part, of their tuition fees, not including additional study costs such as accommodation or textbooks. Your HECS-HELP debt will be indexed each year in line with the Consumer Price Index.

Eligible students will be offered a CSP – you do not need to apply.

International Full-Fee Paying

Tuition costs depend on an international student's study load and discipline. Fees are payable each semester at least four weeks prior to the commencement of your program.
