3 PURPOSE

These Program Requirements set out the approved requirements for the Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies, the Graduate Diploma in Theological Studies, and the Master of Theological Studies.

4 OVERVIEW

4.1 Campus Availability

The Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies, the Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies, and the Master of Theological Studies have been approved for delivery on the Fremantle Campus, the Sydney Campus, and the CIS Strathfield Campus

4.2 Student Availability

The Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies is available for enrolment to domestic students and international students with a student visa on the Fremantle and Sydney Campus only.

The Graduate Certificate of Theological Studies and the Master of Theological Studies are available for enrolment to domestic students only on the Fremantle and Sydney Campuses.

On the Strathfield Campus, the Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies, the Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies, and the Master of Theological Studies are only available for enrolment to domestic students.

4.3 Australian Qualifications Framework

The Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies is accredited by the University as a Level 8 AQF qualification.

The Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies is accredited by the University as a Level 8 AQF qualification.

The Master of Theological Studies is accredited by the University as a Level 9 AQF qualification.

4.4 Duration

The Volume of Learning for the Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies is 0.5 years of equivalent full-time study.

The Volume of Learning for the Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies is 1.0 years of equivalent full-time study.

The Volume of Learning for the Master of Theological Studies is 2.0 years of equivalent full-time study.

An option to complete these programs part-time is available.

4.5 Maximum Duration

4.5.1 The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the **Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies** is three (3) years (including any periods of approved leave of absence) from the date on which they were first enrolled into the program by the University.

4.5.2 The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the **Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies** is four (4) years (including any periods of approved leave of absence) from the date on which they were first enrolled into the program by the University.

4.5.3 The maximum period of time within which a student is permitted to complete the **Master of Theological Studies** is eight (8) years (including any periods of approved leave of absence) from the date on which they were first enrolled into the program by the University.

4.6 Study Mode

The Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies is offered in Internal, External, Multimode and Online Study modes.

The Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies is offered in Internal, External, Multimode and Online Study modes.

The Master of Theological Studies is offered in Internal, External, Multimode and Online Study modes.

4.7 Professional Accreditation

There are no professional accreditation requirements applicable to this Program.

5 ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

5.1 University Admission Requirements

To be eligible for admission to The University of Notre Dame Australia, all applicants must meet the [University's minimum requirements for admission](#). The requirements for admission are detailed in the University's Policy: *Admissions*.

5.2 Specific Program Requirement for Admission

To be eligible for admission to the **Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies**, the **Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies**, or the **Master of Theological Studies** applicants must also meet the following specific requirements:

- As a minimum qualification, a recognised Bachelor degree (AQF Level 7 qualification) or equivalent in any discipline area.

5.3 Credit Pathway

Master of Theological Studies applicants who have five (5) years teaching experience in Catholic Schools may be eligible for 100 UoC of advanced standing.

Master of Theological Studies applicants who are accredited to teach Religious Education in Catholic schools may be eligible for 100 UoC of advanced standing.

6 PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

6.1 Program Description

The **Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies (GradCertTheolStud)** introduces graduate students to key concepts and skills of theology. The Graduate Certificate is a pathway for further learning in the area of theology.

The **Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies (GradDipTheolStud)** is a one year full-time (or equivalent part-time) program. It provides a first basic qualification in Theology and related areas for those with no previous background in theological studies. It is also being designed for those who wish to update their theological knowledge or those preparing for or involved in pastoral ministry, or for those who wish to pursue such studies for reasons of personal and spiritual growth.

The **Master of Theological Studies (MTS)** is a unique opportunity to study Theology both at a Catholic University and at an Ecclesiastical Faculty. Students will learn the foundations of Theology and practice the skills of critical analysis and faith-led exploration, by studying courses in philosophy, Sacred Scripture, Catholic Theology, and associated disciplines. Graduates will be able to communicate the Catholic faith and its foundations in a variety of contexts.

6.2 Program Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of the **Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies** graduates will be able to:

1. Demonstrate advanced theoretical knowledge of Theology in one theological discipline.
2. Critically review, analyse, consolidate, and synthesise knowledge drawn from a particular theological discipline.
3. Apply theological knowledge and skills with prudence and discernment.

Upon successful completion of the **Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies** graduates will be able to:

1. Demonstrate advanced theoretical knowledge of Theology in one or more theological discipline.
2. Critically review, analyse, consolidate, and synthesise knowledge drawn from one or more theological disciplines.
3. Communicate complex theological concepts to a variety of audiences.
4. Apply theological knowledge and skills with prudence and discernment.

Upon successful completion of the **Master of Theological Studies** graduates will be able to:

1. Demonstrate advanced understanding of a complex body of knowledge in a range of theological disciplines.
2. Integrate insights from diverse fields of Theology.
3. Critically review, analyse, consolidate, and synthesise complex theological concepts from a range of theological disciplines.
4. Communicate complex theological concepts and ideas to specialist and non-specialist audiences.
5. Apply theological knowledge and skills with creativity and initiative to new situations in professional practice and/or for further learning, and plan and execute a substantial research-based project.

6.3 Required Courses

To be eligible for the award of **Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies** students must complete, in addition to the electives detailed below in section 6.4, a minimum of 50 units of credit chosen from the courses listed in Appendix B comprising:

- Minimum of 50 units of credit from two (2) Introductory courses

To be eligible for the award of **Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies** students must complete the above required 50 units of credit for the **Graduate Certificate of Theological Studies** and a further 150 units of credit as electives as detailed below in section 6.4 for a total of 200 units of credit.

To be eligible for the award of **Master of Theological Studies** students must complete the above required courses of the **Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies** and must complete a further 350 units of credit, chosen from the courses listed in Appendix B, for a total of 400 units of credit. These 350 units of credit must include:

- One Core Curriculum course as per General Regulations 3.1.1 (d) or a substitute course agreed upon in consultation with the Academic Dean of CIS and Head of School of Philosophy and Theology
- Minimum of 25 units of credit in each of Philosophy, Scripture, and Dogmatic Theology (75 units of credit)
- Maximum of 75 units of credit for Languages
- Electives as detailed below in section 6.4

6.4 Elective Courses

Students enrolled in the **Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies** are required to complete an additional two (2) elective courses (50 units of credit) chosen from the lists of courses in Appendix B, for a total of 100 units of credit, with the following requirements:

- Maximum of 25 units of credit in Philosophy
- Maximum of 25 units of credit in Languages
- Maximum of 50 units of credit in a CIS-defined Discipline if taking courses through CIS

Students enrolled in the **Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies** are required to complete an additional six (6) elective courses (150 units of credit) chosen from the lists of courses in Appendix B for a total of 200 units of credit.

Students enrolled in the **Master of Theological Studies** may undertake a designated research component for 50 units of credit if they are averaging a Credit grade in their coursework. In addition to the designated research component, such students are required to complete an additional twelve (12) elective courses (300 units of credit) chosen from the lists of courses in Appendix B for a total of 400 units of credit. The research is usually completed in the final semester of the program.

Students enrolled in the **Master of Theological Studies** who are not completing a designated research component are to complete an additional fourteen (14) elective courses (350 units of credit) from Appendix B for a total of 400 units of credit.

6.5 Research Project

Students in the **Master of Theological Studies** who have achieved a credit average may choose to complete an extended research component in their degree:

- PHTH6001 Research Methods in Philosophy and Theology

AND

- CISR6200 Research Project (25 units of credit) **OR** PHTH6004 Supervised Dissertation in Philosophy and Theology (25 units of credit)

ALTERNATIVELY, upon consideration of a student's GPA and with the approval of the Program Coordinator or Academic Dean, students may be permitted to do:

- Research Project CISR6210 (50 units of credit) **OR** PHTH6005 Supervised Dissertation in Philosophy and Theology (50 units of credit)

6.6 Course Substitutions

Course substitutions are permitted but must be approved by the Head of School or the Academic Dean

Given these programs are taught through the Catholic Institute of Sydney it is pertinent to include definitions of two common terms used there: fields and disciplines.

At Catholic Institute of Sydney coursework is taught across four **fields** of study:

- **Humanities**
- **Sacred Scripture**
- **Theology**
- **Pastoral Studies**

These **fields** are further divided into distinct **disciplines**. These **disciplines** include:

- in **Humanities** - Philosophy, Church History and Patrology, Auxiliary Disciplines (Ancient Languages);
- in **Sacred Scripture** - Old Testament Studies and New Testament Studies;
- in **Theology** - Dogmatic Theology (inc. Fundamental Theology), Spiritual Theology, Moral Theology; and
- in **Pastoral Studies** - Pastoral Theology and Ministry, Liturgical Studies, and Canon Law.
